Testing the Waters

FDA advisory was issued to understand the sentiments of other health care professionals. There was **no significant opposition**.

FDA Advisory No. 2014 - 067

SUBJECT: Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and Philippine Pharmacists Association (PPhA) Mull Plan to Authorize Community Pharmacists to Administer Vaccines

The FDA-DOH in collaboration with the Philippine Pharmacists Association (PPhA) plans to train and authorize FDA-licensed community pharmacists to administer adult vaccines and other immuno-products. Licensed-pharmacists in FDA-licensed drug outlets who have completed the training course may be authorized by the FDA to vaccinate healthy individuals

The Philippine Pharmacy Law Enacted in 2016



The law faced some challenges and was only enacted in the last session day of the Congress.

(g) Administration of adult vaccines as approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA): Provided, That they shall undergo the training on the safe administration of adult vaccines and management of adverse event following immunization (AEFI) for pharmacists and hold a certificate of training issued by an institution duly accredited by the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC): Provided, further, That the safe administration of vaccines be part of the higher education curriculum for pharmacists; or

The scope of practice of Filipino pharmacists includes administration of adult vaccines, a deliberate move to avoid pediatric vaccines due to stronger opposition.

(b) Adult vaccines refer to cervical cancer, flu (influenza), pneumococcal, other pre-exposure prophylactic vaccines to be administered to patients aged eighteen (18) years and above, and such other vaccines as may be defined by the Department of Health (DOH) in an administrative issuance;














Current Situation in Hong Kong



- No separation of prescribing & dispensing of drugs
 - * Vaccination Services 2 in progress
- Obtained verbal support from top official, Secretary for Food and Health & Dean of HKU Li
 Ka Shing Faculty of Medicine
- No regulation to stop pharmacist to do vaccination but the vaccines are prescription items **General Practice: most doctors will do the vaccination themselves.**

In reality, we can do it under the supervision of doctors or you receive prescription for the vaccines/ or Department of Health will send nurses to do outreach vaccination programs



Vaccination Training and practice



PSHK provides training including practical session in the community

- The trained pharmacists have performed seasonal influenza vaccination under the Government Vaccination
 Subsidy Scheme through PSHK Vaccination Outreach Program
- Plan to have a Certified Training Program jointly organized with The University of Hong Kong

Advancing Hong Kong Pharmacy Profession Development – Local Continuing Education

Programme funded by HKSAR government



Barriers



- Classification of vaccines
- Insurance (expensive or not accepted)
- Space (as some community pharmacies are quite small in size)
- Advance order of vaccines, otherwise, stocks might not be available
- Public support (change mind-set)



Actions needed to advance the issue

FIP DIGITAL PROGRAMME

- 1. Authorize pharmacists to do COVID-19 and Flu vaccines independently
 - Continue to lobby government especially before the COVID vaccine delivers to Hong Kong
- 2. Reclassify vaccines from prescription to pharmacy item
- 3. Invite FIP management to send support letter to HKSAR Chief Executive, Secretary for Food and Health and Pharmacy and Poisons Board to share international experience on vaccination by pharmacists
- 4. Lobby members of Pharmacy and Poisons Board to support the reclassification
- 5. Promote the new role of pharmacists
- 6. Continue to gain trust from public and other HCP
 - More collaboration with other HCP
 - Follow the big trend, e.g. District Health Centers which target to provide Primary Care Services
